Evangelism Committee


The Evangelism Committee met at 4pm on Thursday, November 3, 2016, in the Fellowship Hall. Four of our five-member committee were present.

Four of us attended and participated in the Hallelujah Harvest held at the First Assembly of God on Halloween evening. Many thanks to Pastor Joe, Nina Dobyns and Doug Palmer for their efforts. Joe is a balloon animal maker extraordinaire! A crowd estimated at 3,700 attended and enjoyed the food, rides and games. Prayers and Bible readings were prevalent and there was no doubt that our Lord was "in the house!"

Mission Update

What a fantastic second Sunday in November: first, a great Thanksgiving feast, and second, outstanding participation in filling 52 shoeboxes which, via Samaritan's Purse, will be sent to children around the world. The Mission Committee thanks all who contributed with items and cash, and to all who in record time folded the boxes and then filled them. We were cleaned up and gone by 1:30pm.

The new Mission project is our annual participation in Polk County's "Empty Stocking" program. This is a joint Christmas project sponsored by the Livingston Interagency Council to help provide Christmas for the children of approved families. This year we have two: one with an infant girl (1 ½) and the other with a girl (5) and a boy (8). All donated items must be unwrapped and at the church no later

than Dec. 12th, as we must turn everything in on the 14th. Last year, 248 low income families with 693 children were provided items to help them enjoy Christmas, and we sponsored two families with a total of six children.

Mission has turned in its 2017 budget request, which is \$28,400, just a bit higher than our current one. All of these funds go to help others, mostly in the Polk County area; check out the listing on the board in the Narthex.

If anyone would like to join the Mission committee, our chairs are always welcome for your use. Let me know.



What you need:

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 3 cups chocolate chips
- Microwave-safe bowl
- Spoon or spatula
- 2 Tbsp. shortening
- Baking tray lined with wax paper
- Red and green M&M's (or sprinkles)

What you do:

- 1. Lightly spray bowl and wax paper.
- 2. Microwave chocolate chips in bowl for one-minute intervals until chocolate is melted. (Stir after each minute.)
- 3. Stir in shortening. Heat in 10-second intervals, stirring until smooth.
- 4. Pour chocolate onto tray and firmly press in M&M's or sprinkles.
- 5. Refrigerate until firm. Remove bark and break into pieces.

In the 1860s, poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow had reason to despair: America was at war with itself, his son was severely wounded in battle and his wife died in a fire. The first Christmas after his wife's death, Longfellow wrote, "How inexpressibly sad are all holidays."

Three years later, on Christmas Day 1864, Longfellow penned a poem that later became the song "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day." The lyrics move from despair to hope — and, thanks to Jesus, so can we.

And in despair I bowed my head.

There is no peace on earth, I said!

For hate is strong, and mocks the song of peace on earth, good will to men!

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep:
God is not dead, nor doth he sleep!
The wrong shall fail, the right prevail,
